This year, James played a key role in recovering more than \$2 billion on behalf of clients that invested and lost money when funds managed by Allianz collapsed at the beginning of the pandemic. He was also part of the team that filed the first lawsuit over the fund collapse in July 2020. James commented to *Law360* on the importance of the case and the challenging and evolving landscape:

While the numbers seem staggering, they don't tell the full story. "What we came to know — which we didn't know at the very beginning of the case — was exactly why the funds failed...It was clear that unpacking that and figuring out how to present it and bringing those claims to conclusion was what made them so significant."

The profile also focuses on his background — during a class on corporations at the George Washington University Law School, his interest was peaked for a career where he got to "check" corporate misconduct. He continued to further his interest by taking internships relating to the space and eventually thrived at BLB&G, where he leads the Global Securities and Litigation Monitoring Team.

"There aren't tens of thousands of people doing what I do...In every way, the work is so satisfying to me because it's challenging and interesting. I get to have impactful cases that I litigate. And I get to be on the side that I think is generally right."
