

Daniel Meyer Examines Changes to Delaware's Books-and-Records Demand Law in *University of Miami Business Law Review*

In the article “Blunting the ‘Tools at Hand’: Recent Developments in Delaware Books-and-Records Demand Law” [published](#) by the *University of Miami Business Law Review*, BLB&G Senior Counsel Daniel Meyer examines recent changes to Delaware's books-and-records demand law under Section 220, challenging the narrative that these actions overly burden judicial resources.
